Saturday, April 20th the Presbytery de Cristo and Presbytery of Grand Canyon will be meeting at Valley Presbyterian Church!

Presbyterians are known for committees and business meetings, however, by comparison this is the Presbyterian equivalent of the Bishop coming for a visit. Actually, the Greek word Presbyterian and the Latin word Bishop refer to the same identity, elected commissioners from individual churches who travel to represent the large (higher) gathering of the Church.

Approximately 60-90 Ministers and Session members will be here for Worship followed by committee reports and business of the individual churches and lunch fellowship.

The Sunday following Pastor Larry's death, when we were grieving in mourning, ministers from across our Presbytery came to our Church to witness to their support and prayers for us.

Our Presbytery is in a unique circumstance, that de Cristo Presbytery (the greater Tucson area) is quite small (29 churches with 3 larger than our congregation and the majority far smaller), so we have partnered with Grand Canyon Presbytery which covers the greater Phoenix area. When the Presbytery is meeting on April 20th, in person and by Zoom, this will represent all the Presbyterian Churches in Arizona.

From Pastor Craig

From Top to Bottom, Profane to Sacred

Ordinarily March is a busy Springtime for us, while the rest of our Nation is buried in snow and ice. This year, there was only one week between all of Patio Sale and Holy Week for meetings to occur and regular business of Lent to be transacted.

In early March 2024, 1 restroom suddenly backed up, then the Washing Machine began flooding, then a floor drain! We called Roto-Rooter who tried to snake the pipes, and with a camera diagnosed that our 45 year old Cast-Iron waste/sewer pipes were caked in rust reducing their diameter. The day before Patio Sale began, the same restrooms began backing up again. By Sunday morning, Patio Sale was done, and all except 2 restrooms and even the kitchen sinks were shut down. After Coffee Hour, the only remaining restroom functioning was in the Office-wing where most people could not find it. Monday morning, the Plumbers began work getting the building back in working order, including running chains through the rust to clean the cast iron pipes. They then added two additional Clean-out pipes, in order to pump water into the waste system to flush it out. In total, an unanticipated cost of \$17,600.

At the end of 2023, the company regularly inspecting our flat roofs alerted Session, that the Hailstorm two years ago had pock-marked the membrane of the roof. Preliminary estimates were hundreds of thousands of dollars. However, Lynch Roofing who replaced all of the perimeter tile of our roofs in early 2023 determined that what was needed was a fresh "hot-mopping" to seal and coat the roofing material. Cost of this was an unanticipated \$35,200.

Then miracles began to occur... Sharing concern with our membership about the plumbing, over \$7,000 was donated by our membership! Your generosity is incredible, thank you very much. Also, the Insurance Company, which had previously reimbursed the Church over \$100,000 for replacement of 7 air conditioners, repair to 2 more, replacement of skylights all damaged by the 2022 Hailstorm, now reimbursed our Church the full-cost \$35,200 of repairing the roof! Ultimately, while we have been forced to make \$52,8000 of repairs, this is costing the Church's Reserves about \$10,000. Please forgive the inconvenience of our Church being under construction for these projects. We pray everything will be completed and cleaned up as we enter into the holiest time of the year, in preparation for Easter.

I hope that our celebrations will be especially meaningful for you this year, as we remember: our Church cannot travel through Israel and Palestine the week after Easter due to hatred and war, with over 1,200 Israelis killed Oct 7th and over 30,000 Palestinians killed in retaliation, and many hostages still held. Also, that this year, on Maundy (Holy) Thursday we will celebrate with a full Passover Seder dinner in Fellowship Hall; worship on Good Friday at Noon; view the film and discuss *The Passion of the Christ* at 1pm Paschal Saturday; Sunrise/Sonrise at 6am on Easter Sunday, followed by a Continental Breakfast, and the Sacrament of Communion in worship of the Resurrection at 9:30am. While we are gathered as The Church, John and Clair Howell will be taking 100 Spanish Bibles from our Church to Relize where their daughter is serving as a Missionary

FINANCES

The handling of money always raises concerns in faith communities. The easiest and best means of resolving any concerns is full transparency, simplification, and accountability. It was not so many years ago, our Church was put on an austerity budget because an imbalanced budget was covered by Memorial Gifts. Several matters are currently in process for our Finance Committee, Patio Sale, Foundation and Session.

Last month, the Professional Audit of 2022 was completed by an outside accounting firm, assuring that all receipts and expenditures were handled and recorded faithfully. One of their recommendations was that our Church invest in an automatic Check Deposit scanner. We have done so, trying this out during the Patio Sale. Now, rather than holding checks until volunteer Counters could record checks and our Corporate Officers physically making deposits at the Bank; all checks can be scanned from our Church Offices into our Bank Accounts, identical to the Tellers at the Bank.

The week of Patio Sale, members of our Church who are not current Counters, Corporate Officers, on the Finance Committee, the Foundation, or the Session/Deacons, who were elected by the Session, provided their own Audit of the 2023 Financial records. These three members also found that there were no discrepancies or irregularities.

A clarification that needs to be crystal clear is that when you make contributions to our Church, if those donations are for a designated purpose (i.e., Flowers, your Pledge which goes to the operating Budget, Plumbing, or a Special Mission), ... we are legally required to spend those funds for that purpose and no other. If, on the other hand, contributions (like Memorial Gifts) are received without designation, those funds are then designated by our Gifts & Memorials Committee. If the Committee does not allocate those gifts within 12 months, then according to our By-Laws, any amount over \$20,000 is automatically transferred to the VPC Foundation.

The VPC Foundation is a totally separate Corporation from Valley Presbyterian Church. The Foundation has been reviewing their By-Laws and Investment Strategy and have clarified that while in the past there may have been confusion, the purpose of the VPC Foundation is to invest these Reserves to grow as Endowments of the Church.

Valley Presbyterian Church has four separate financial resources.


- Your annual Pledges and regular Contributions are used to finance the Annual Operating Costs of our Church (Salaries, Missions, Electricity)
- The Session also maintains two accounts which carry-over from year to year, for Capital Improvements and Operating Reserves in the event something like Roof repairs, Plumbing occur.
- Third, we are fortunate to have the VPC Foundation, which is invested for perpetual growth of endowments, and according to their By-Laws annually makes available about \$40-50,000 for Capital Improvement projects if needed (In the past, this paid for Painting the Church, Tiling the Roof perimeter, Repaving; and in 2024 is anticipated to not be drawn upon).
- Fourth, you The Church have always been incredibly generous and supportive of concerns which are not provided for in one of the other three.



Based on the real-life story of the author's mother, Urrea's novel not only provides a look at a fascinating enterprise but also confronts the danger and anguish of a perilous time and place. The Caregiver's Compass "Skilled"



Stephen Minister trainees learn about the Caregiver's Compass in their very first lesson. The Caregiver's Compass provides direction for the journey on becoming a Stephen Minister and at the end of every lesson the trainees are asked to relate what they had learned in the lesson that relates to each "direction" of the Caregiver's Compass. This month I will give my viewpoint on what it means for Stephen Ministers to be skilled, at the bottom of the Caregiver's Compass.

For the last couple of months, I have been able to find Bible verses that pertain to compassionate and full of faith. Unfortunately, the Bible has little to say about skilled. Here is one verse I found. If the ax is dull and its edge unsharpened, more strength is needed but skill will bring success. Ecclesiastes 10:10. Huh? Say what? And then I thought about it and realized that I can apply this to Stephen Ministers.

Most people who gravitate to becoming Stephen Ministers have a natural affinity for caring. They generally have a desire to be a positive force in people's lives but may not always know the best way to provide the unique care the person they are trying to help may need. The dull and unsharpened ax has the ability to chop wood but would most likely take a very long time to produce mostly uneven pieces with others pulverized to splinters! However, a sharpened edge will produce gratifyingly even pieces of wood in a shorter period of time. In the same way, the potential Stephen Minister goes through a vigorous 50-hour training course where they learn to listen intently, provide a compassionate presence, validate the hurt and grief the person is experiencing, refrain from giving advice, and trust that they are merely the "caregiver" while God is the "curegiver." The training includes lots of role playing, which to be honest, I did not enjoy. But like the dull ax, Stephen Ministers' unskilled caregiving gifts are sharpened and strengthened to bring caregiving success.

On another subject, Stephen Ministry Sunday is on April 7. Many of the Stephen Ministers will be participating in the service and two of them will provide their personal testimonies on what being a Stephen Minister means to them. We also will be commissioning our new Stephen Ministers who have recently graduated from Stephen Minister training.

Many people wonder why we are called "Stephen Ministers." It was named after Stephen from the story of The Choosing of the Seven from Acts 6. In the early days of the Church, the number of converts was growing phenomenally. The apostles were taking care of the widows and providing them food along with their responsibilities of ministry and healing. Apparently, the widows who were Greek (Gentiles) were not always receiving the daily distribution of food, while the Hebrew widows were. The apostles realized that they did not have the time to fulfill all of their responsibilities, so they decided to delegate. They assigned seven disciples who were known to be full of the Holy Spirit and wisdom to take care of the widows and orphans while the Apostles continued their ministry of the word and prayer. Stephen was the first named of the seven to become a caregiver. Thus, Stephen Ministry is named after the first official Christian caregiver.

Next month we will move on to how Stephen Ministers are "Trustworthy."

A Call to Love

On March 22, 2024, about 30 members of our congregation attended a presentation by Rev. Jerry Haas of the United Methodist Church of Green Valley. His talk highlighted the needs of persons with dementia and their caregivers. Among the many topics Rev. Haas addressed the way in which their church congregation began a process to learn about these needs and how the congregation might reach out in Christian love to be helpful was one of them.

One of the people present at the talk stood and said, "This feels like a call to action."

No Act of Love is Ever Wasted...

"The question remains, "where is the Church in all of this? But the deeper question is, "where is God in all of this?" The church's responsibility is to answer the question of a ministry for persons with dementia and their caregivers. God has already answered that question. God never forsakes the weak and needy of any generation. God is present in the souls of people with dementia and with those who care for them. So hope remains that even when love seems to be defeated, no act of love is ever wasted."

Our first step is to follow the example of the Methodist Church. We would like to begin by offering an opportunity for people to gather to read and discuss *No Act of Love is Ever Wasted - The Spirituality of Caring for Persons with Dementia* by Jane Marie Thibault, PhD and Richard L. Morgan, PhD. A similar book discussion was the catalyst for the Methodist Church to begin, among other things, their Esperanza Hope Memory Cafe for those experiencing memory loss, their caregivers, friends, and loved ones.

Esperanza Hope Memory Cafe is held the 2nd Thursday of each month at 2:00 pm in the United Methodist Church of Green Valley 300 W. Esperanza Blvd (corner of La Canada and Esperanza.) The program lasts about an hour. All are welcome. The next Memory Cafe is April 11, 2024. There is no charge. They do ask that you call the church office to let them know you are coming (520-625-4712).

And, so, we begin. If you are interested in joining with others to read, discuss, and formulate possible next steps for our congregation, please call the Church Office (520) 625-5023 to let them know of your interest. Then watch for more information.




Beth Shalom Synagogue will be hosting Rabbi J. Salazar, a trained "Sofer" (Hebrew term for a Scribe who calligraphs sacred text) on Tuesday, April 16th. The Synagogue is offering opportunity (by appointment) for individuals to fill-in outlined letters on our new Torah Scroll's parchment, with a suggested contribution of \$18 per person. You might know that in Jewish tradition, each of us is encouraged to "write" our own Torah; but since only highly skilled Sofer/Scribes can do so in the authorized style, we can all still fulfill the holy obligation ("Mitzvah") by holding on to the Scribe's hand as we complete a letter.

In addition, we have arranged with Rabbi Salazar to offer a program for the non-Jewish community, at which he will discuss the Torah Scroll, the ancient calligraphy style in which it is written, and demonstrate his Scribal tools and technique. We invite you and any of your congregants whom you think might be interested to attend in person: at Beth Shalom Temple Center, 4:00-5:00 pm.

And a special "Thank You" to all of our VPC Staff who were there for us every step of the way. Even Pastor Craig gets into the act. He loves being part of Patio Sale.

We are excited to share with you the unique opportunity VPC has been given. In December 2023 the church was given \$620k in **undesignated** bequests. The Committee Charter requires us to have the monies allocated within a rolling 12-month period, or with the current gift, by the end of December 2024. Any amount remaining will be invested by the Foundation. The Gifts & Memorials Committee Charter states that all expenditures strive first to glorify God and further His kingdom, and second, to benefit VPC and its members, the Church Community, and to make a difference in the world.

How will these funds be allocated? All requests for funding may only be submitted from <u>a VPC Committee</u>. If you have ideas as an individual, take them to the relevant committee (Mission, Buildings and Grounds, etc.).

- The individual committees will be responsible for choosing the projects to pursue, filling out the *Request for Support*, administering approved funding and reporting to Session.
- The Gifts and Memorials Committee's responsibility is to evaluate the requests and seek approval from Session for the funds requested. Our hope is to spread these funds over a number of worthy opportunities.

We hope to have the forms used to request funds approved by the Session before our April meeting. We hope to begin evaluating requests by mid-April. It may take 1-2 months to evaluate requests and get the Session's approval. For this reason, all requests must be made no later than Oct 1, 2024.

These are **undesignated** funds given to the church. Designated giving goes directly to the committee responsible (e.g. funds for St Andrew's Children's Clinic goes directly to Mission committee.) We are excited about this opportunity to be able to enhance God's work through the generosity of those who have gone before us.





Reasons Why We Donate Quilts Aviva Children's Services

Some years ago, the Women's Ministry had a representative from AVIVA CHILDREN'S SERVICES speak to their luncheon group about the works of the agency. I was so impressed with what they were doing for foster children at that time. As the needs of the foster care community have changed through the years, AVIVA has adapted itself to support their needs.

Previously, a counselor told me that when she would go to a home to meet a new foster child, she loved taking a quilt especially for them as an ice breaker. These children are often taken from their homes without any of their belongings. We delivered 17 quilts to the agency this quilting season.

Aviva Children's Services' mission is to improve the quality of life for children who are victims of neglect, abuse and poverty and are in the care of Arizona's Department of Child Safety (DCS). Aviva responds to the needs of children in foster care by providing programs and resources to enhance their self-esteem and well-being as well as supplying necessity items such as clothing, shoes, blankets and personal care items.

Aviva Children's Services was founded in 1978 by a group of concerned citizens who came together to address shortfalls in Arizona's foster care system. Over the years Aviva has provided an array of support to children and families involved in the foster care system. These services have included a tutoring program for children, a supervised visitation program, a parent training program, a parent peer support program, a specialized visitation program for mothers and newborns and a community resource center for kinship and foster families.

In July of 2019 Aviva became a wholly owned subsidiary of Easterseals Blake Foundation. Together, Easterseals Blake Foundation and Aviva Children's Services will develop a **Center of Excellence** for children involved with or at high risk for involvement with the Foster/Kinship care system. The Aviva Center will be a preferred provider of system partners such as the Department of Child Safety, State Foster Care Health Plans, school systems, law enforcement and families along the continuum of risk, removal and reunification.

April is Parkinson's Disease Awareness Month

Although most people with Parkinson's first develop the disease after age 60, about 5 – 10 percent experience onset before the age of 50. Studies suggest the disease affects more men than women. Parkinson's disease is a brain disorder that causes unintended or uncontrollable movements, shaking, stiffness, and difficulty with coordination and balance. Symptoms begin gradually and worsen over time. Symptoms may include difficulty walking and talking, mental and behavioral changes, sleep difficulties, depression, memory difficulties, and fatigue.

The most prominent symptoms and signs of Parkinson's disease occur when the nerve cells in the basal ganglia become impaired and/or die. This area of the brain controls movement. The nerve cells, neurons, normally produce an important chemical, dopamine. When these neurons die or are impaired, they produce less dopamine, which causes movement problems. Those with Parkinson's disease also lose verve endings that produce norepinephrine, main chemical messenger of the sympathetic nervous system, which controls many functions such as heart rate and blood pressure. The loss of norepinephrine might help to explain some of the non-movement features of Parkinson's such as fatigue, decreased movement through digestive tract, irregular blood pressure, and sudden drop in blood pressure when changing positions from sitting or lying positions to standing. Many brain cells of people with Parkinson's disease contain Lewy bodies, unusual clumps of the protein alpha-synuclein.

The four main symptoms of Parkinson's disease include tremor in hands, arms, legs, jaw, or head, muscle stiffness (muscle remains contracted for a long time), slowness of movement, impaired coordination, and balance, which may lead to falls. Other symptoms include depression and other emotional changes, difficulty swallowing, chewing or speaking, constipation or urinary problems, and skin problems. The symptoms and the rate of progression differ among individuals. People with Parkinson's disease often develop a parkinsonian gait that includes a tendency to lean forward, take small quick steps, and may have difficulty with starting or continuing movement. Symptoms often begin on one side of the body or even in one extremity on one side. As the disease progresses, it eventually affects both sides of the body; however, symptoms may be more severe on one side that on the other. Many people with Parkinson's disease note that prior to experiencing stiffness and tremor, they had sleep problems, loss of smell, restless legs, and constipation. Some of these symptoms may also occur with normal aging, discuss with your healthcare provider these symptoms, if they worsen, or begin to interfere with daily living. Some may also experience changes with cognitive function, memory, attention, and the ability to plan and accomplish tasks. Stress, depression, and some medications may also contribute to these changes in cognition. As the disease progresses, some may develop dementia and be diagnosed with Parkinson's dementia, a type of Lewy body dementia. Talk with your healthcare provider if you or a loved one is diagnosed with Parkinson's disease and is experiencing difficulties with memory or thinking.

CLERK'S CORNER

MAUREEN RAMSAY, CLERK OF SESSION The Presbytery

On April 20th, Presbytery de Cristo will hold its spring meeting at Valley Presbyterian. Many of you may not know what the Presbytery does or why we even belong to a Presbytery. The Book of Order (Section G-3.0301) states that: *The Presbytery is the council serving as a corporate expression of the church within a certain district and is composed of all the congregations and ministers of the Word and Sacrament within that district. The Presbytery is responsible for the government of the church throughout its district and assisting and supporting the witness of congregations to the sovereign activity of God in the world, so that all congregations become communities of faith, hope, love, and witness. The Presbytery has the responsibility and power to:*

a. provide that the Word of God may be truly preached and heard.

This includes organizing, merging, dismissing, and dissolving congregations, overseeing congregations without pastors.

b. provide that the Sacraments may be rightly administered and received.

This responsibility includes authorizing communion for meetings, fellowship groups, new church developments; authorizing and training ruling elders to administer or preside at the Lord's Supper; and exercising pastoral care for congregations and members of presbytery in order that the Sacraments may be received as a means of grace.

c. nurture the covenant community of disciples of Christ.

This responsibility includes ordaining, receiving, dismissing, installing, removing, and disciplining its members who are ministers of the Word and Sacrament, and supporting congregations in developing missions, serving in judicial matters, etc.

Presbytery de Cristo consists of about 29 congregations spread across Southern Arizona and New Mexico. The size of the congregations ranges from 20 to over 1,000 members. According to Brad Munroe, Presbytery Pastor of Presbytery de Cristo, the Presbytery provides many services to each of its congregations. He sent me a list of over 100 tasks that the Presbytery performs. They help in Consultation and Care, Pastoral Transitions, Mission Interpretation and Support, Communication, Governance, Leadership Training, and General Assembly Resources. Like the session, Presbytery has committees where these tasks are completed.

They include Administration, Commission on Ministry, Leadership, Macedonian Ministries, Preparation for Ministry, Nominations, and Permanent Judicial Commission. The work of these committees is supported by prayers and monies donated through the per capita collected by each congregation. Any one of us can be a member of a presbytery committee.

In these days of shrinking memberships and increased dissension in main line churches, the Presbytery serves as a guide and support to congregations. In the Preface to his book *Waging Peace: Engaging Conflict and Embracing Difference in the Body of Christ*, Brad Munroe talks about striving to bring churches together by supporting a Macedonian Ministry, which is a volunteer group of pastors who meet monthly to discuss and debate, challenge, and encourage one another, a Calvinist version of Eat, Pray, Love. He relates that after Pastor Larry's death in 2016, he called various pastors, associates, lay and retired pastors to come to Valley Pres. to attend worship and to offer a ministry of presence and pastoral care to the congregation. He was hoping for five to eight pastors. Twenty-three pastoral care givers were present the Sunday following Larry's death. This is the kind of work that the Presbytery does.

I think of the Presbytery as the next step in church leadership after the Session. The Presbytery reports to the Synod, which is a group of Presbyteries, and the Synods report to the General Assembly. The Session sends representatives to the Presbytery meetings to vote and have a voice in its decisions. The Presbytery sends representatives to Synod meetings and then to the General Assembly. This year, our Presbytery has voted to send our own pastor, Rev. Craig Lindsey, and elder Judy Aguayo as their representatives to the General Assembly meeting in Salt Lake City in June. They will decide the major issues that are facing the Presbyterian church. We are privileged to have so many elders in our congregation willing to serve on Session, as commissioners to Presbytery and General Assembly meetings.

If My Wife is Holy Enough, Can I Take Another?"

The "long semester" at Nile Theological College began earlier this month. I am teaching Contextual Theology, one of my favorite courses. Some rightfully argue that all theology is contextual, that is, our understanding of God is birthed from our experience, from our context. Stephen Bevans describes contextual theology as "dialogue" between two realities: the experience of the past as recorded in Scripture and church tradition, and the experience or present to which we who do theology now live (Bevans, 1992). David Bosch, the noted South African missiologist, describes contextual theology as "theology from below," from the underside of history, informed by the social sciences, a theology who's primary "interlocuter" or communication partner is the poor and the socially marginalized (Bosch, 1991).

As my students and I are learning together, we recognize the need to understand the Gospel and how it relates to our cultures and peoples. On that note, at the end of class during our second week together, John, a pastor, who sits in the front near the door, asked a personal and culturally informed question when he asked, "If my wife is holy enough, can I take another [wife]?" Despite some chuckles from a few classmates, I assured John that his question was appropriate and helpful. When I asked the class if John's question was a question shared by other members of John's people group (the Nuer), everyone affirmed that to be the case. As we were at the end of the day, I suggested that we return to John's question at the beginning of class the following week.

Before we met the following week, I prepared a worksheet which listed several questions and a list of scripture references concerning marriage to help us. My goal was threefold: to discuss the meaning of marriage according to the Nuer and other people groups in South Sudan, to discuss what Jesus says about marriage and God's original intention for marriage, and to compare the two. As we began the discussion about the purpose of marriage according to local Nuer culture, these dominant themes emerged: the priority of children, protection, status, power, and overpowering others through procreation of sons. We discussed the reasons a man would have more than one wife, all of which can be identified in the above themes. When we looked at what Jesus said about marriage, we observe that he cites the creation account in Genesis.

"But at the beginning of creation God 'made them male and female.' 'For this reason, a man will leave his father and mother and be united to his wife, and the two will become one flesh.' So they are no longer two, but one. (from Mark 10: 6 – 8)

One important distinction between the purpose of marriage defined by Jesus and by the Nuer lies in the idea of companionship and becoming 'one flesh'. This idea was not cited as a purpose for marriage according to Nuer tradition and culture.

The root question we discussed was whether it was good for a Nuer man, or even a pastor, to take a second wife, commonly practiced here in South Sudan. It seems that the motivation for John taking a second wife is that his wife is becoming old. One of the students, half-humorously and half seriously, quipped, "Well, if a wife's husband is getting old, shouldn't she also be able to marry a second husband, a younger man?"

One experienced pastor felt that despite church law, which permits lay church members to have more than one wife, that the practice of marriage within the church should be for all men to have one wife only, that being the case for pastors/elders and for everyday Christians. Considering scripture, his view rings true, but the culture is still so strong. How do we make sense of the two? Although I am not sure we fully satisfied John in response to his question, I do believe that as a class we had a meaningful discussion, addressing John's question from many important angles.

A couple of days later I was asked by an Ethiopian neighbor concerning how I had advised my student. I told him that my goal was not to give advice, but rather to help my student and the class meaningfully explore this issue for themselves, finding solutions and owning decisions. Advice from a missionary might be helpful in the short run, but long-lasting and transformative change will result from thoughtful and scripturally informed decisions made by local Christians themselves. As Christians, we invite the light of the Gospel and the Person of Jesus Christ to speak into our contexts and our cultures. Jesus must be Lord overall. In the end, as my professor at Nairobi Evangelical Graduate School of Theology (NEGST) says, "Our faith becomes our culture." Lord, may it be so!
